
The Interactive Bulletin Board

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Teaching Objectives

Students will

- Learn selected material from the redesigned Naturalization test
- Use their knowledge and classroom resources to answer worksheet questions
- Use an interactive bulletin board to expedite their activity and share information with other classes



Background

Because my class is a mix of Beginning/Low Intermediate students and is not a citizenship class, I chose some interesting information about our country from the Redesigned Naturalization test. I approached this material as a unit on the U.S.A. and didn't focus on "citizenship" per se.

Procedure

1. My class meets M-F mornings from 9-12. Over the course of a few days, the class completed an overview of the topics for the citizenship test.

I used selected parts of the book *Entry Into Citizenship*. [Becker, A. (2000). Lincolnwood: McGraw Hill]. Much in this ©2000 version is applicable or adaptable to the redesigned test. Later editions of this book are available.

Two activities that I personally designed for the United States history section are attached. The students seemed to really enjoy the little skits for each one, and I think the skits helped them remember important things about each topic.

2. Next the students worked in pairs or groups using the worksheets that are included at the end of this document. The students read the questions and found the answers either on the interactive bulletin board or in the materials we used earlier in class.



The Bulletin Board

To make the bulletin board, I printed both the questions and answers on half sheets of paper and displayed them in categories according to the citizenship test. I placed each question on top of the answer, and I attached a little tab on the bottom that says "LIFT." Whenever someone lifts the top sheet that contains the question, the answer is underneath. I used regular letters for the question, and italicized letters with bullets for the answers. I stapled the materials on the bulletin board, and that method of attaching them held up well under repeated "liftings."

My bulletin board materials are included for you in an accompanying document. You will need to cut the question/answer sheets across the middle, stack them, and add the lift tabs






Comments:

 I was pleasantly surprised to find how much the students really enjoyed learning more about the United States. Most of them knew almost nothing about American history and about our government, and very little about our symbols and holidays. They were very interested to learn about how our country was formed, about how our government works, about the Civil War and World War II, and especially about our flag and national anthem.

- Although I chose questions that I thought were the most relevant, there still were a few of the questions that I felt were a little too difficult for my level of students, so I probably would omit some of them from this project in the future. Other teachers can use their experience to gear this project to the needs of their particular students.
- The bulletin board was very helpful as a way for students to find information easily since it was laid out systematically in categories. It was also accessible to other ESL classes or other interested viewers, and our class received a lot of positive feedback.
